3 COMMUNITY PROFILE

A profile of the community is useful in the context of a Master Plan in order to identify the demographic composition of the town and recent trends which are affecting population, as well as to place the town within the broader context of surrounding municipalities in the region.

3.1 Population

Kensington has experienced a pattern of population change similar to that of many towns in southern New Hampshire over the last two hundred and fifty years. Early growth based on agriculture and the shoe industry was followed by a decline in the post-Civil War era. Heavy population declines in the early part of the twentieth century, caused by the general decline of the agricultural economy, were followed by steady increases in population after World War II, as the character of the town started shifting from agricultural to rural residential.

The population density has nearly tripled from the earliest settlement, but the town remains in the bottom quartile of ranking by population per square mile in Rockingham county, according to the Office of State Planning. Kensington is still basically a rural community in spite of the growth in recent decades.




Figure 1: Kensington Population History 1737-2000

3.1.1.1.1.1 Population Growth Since 1960

It is in the last few decades that Kensington, as well as the rest of southern New Hampshire, has experienced the most rapid and significant growth. In contrast to the slow growth and decline of the first two centuries, in which the population nearly doubled between the town's founding in 1737 and 1800, then gradually declined to below the original population level by 1920, Kensington has more than doubled in size in the last forty years. This latest pattern of growth shows no signs of stopping or reversing.

In comparison to the growth experienced by neighboring towns, the region, and the state, Kensington falls about in the middle. While its growth has outpaced that of the state as a whole and several surrounding towns, it has grown at approximately the same rate as neighboring Exeter, and more slowly than the average for Rockingham County and the towns of Seabrook and East Kingston.

3.2 Demographics

According to preliminary data available from the 2000 US Census (see section III-c, following), Kensington continues to be a small, homogeneous town of primarily home-owning families. The percentage of women slightly outnumbers the percentage of men.

Of the 657 households recorded in 2000, 81% were described as "family households", half of which had children under 18 years of age. Over 90% of the housing units were owner-occupied; only 60 out of the 657 households were listed as occupied by renters. As of the 1990 Census (Appendix E), 33% of households in the town had lived here for 5 years or less, while 25% had been at their residence for more than 20 years. 84% of town residents commuted outside the town for employment. Comparable data is not yet available from the 2000 Census.

Kensington's population has grown "at the ends" and declined "in the middle" over the last ten years. The population of children 14 years old and under, as well as those in the age ranges of 35-54 and 65-84, has increased significantly, while the population of young adults aged 15-34 has declined. This reflects a trend towards a resident population of generally middle-aged families with school-aged children, as well as the aging of the long-time resident population.




Figure 2: Kensington Demographics by Age Group, 1990 & 2000

3.3 Population Projections

The New Hampshire Office of State Planning prepares periodic population projections for towns in the state. According to their latest figures (January 1999), the Town is projected to grow at approximately a 2% annual growth rate for the next five years, with growth then slowing to approximately 1.5% per annum. This projected rate leads to an estimated population of 2266 in the year 2010 and 2748 in the year 2020.




Figure 3: Projected Population, Kensington 2000-2020

Given Kensington's relatively undeveloped status, its desirable location near several major expressways, the planned introduction of rail service through Exeter, and existing sub development plans, these estimates may be low. Even small changes in the annual growth rate can have a significant impact on population projections over a twenty-year period; at an average annual growth rate of 2.5%, the town would reach a population of 2425 by 2010 and just over 3100 by 2020, doubling the size of the town within 20 years. These numbers point out the need to plan ahead for significant growth in the Town, and the need to manage that growth carefully.
