Board of Selectmen Annual Report

In many ways, 2023 was a quiet year for the Town of Kensington. Roads were paved, car registrations were renewed, streets were patrolled, emergencies were responded to, building permits were filed. Stable leadership across all departments has afforded consistent quality in the provision of taxpayer-funded services. As ever, the Board is grateful to all of the town employees who work every day to make sure all of our neighbors receive the prompt, courteous, and cheerful assistance they deserve. Our thanks go as well to all of the volunteers who serve on the committees and boards that make it possible for the Town to function. Kensington is a generous, civic-minded community and it is a privilege to serve alongside you.

In 2023 the Town conducted revaluation of all properties as mandated by state law. The Town follows a five-year cycle in this process, and the market changes since 2018 resulted in a substantial growth in our property values. Townwide, the average increase in values was 62%. As a result, the tax rate for 2024 is considerably lower. The Board is aware that changes in valuations can be confusing and upsetting. We have done our best to ensure that the Town has complied with the law as fairly as possible. We also know that increases in town, school, and county budgets hit all of our pocketbooks as taxpayers. For the Town's part, we've been working hard to keep any increases to a minimum. Despite some rollercoaster inflation over the past couple of years, the Town budget has seen increases of less than six percent for two years in a row. The Board is also sensitive to the fact that changes to taxes and valuations can have a disproportionate impact on some of our most vulnerable neighbors, particularly some of our fixed-income seniors. We've worked with some residents on proposing changes to our elderly exemptions and veterans credits that will appear on the warrant in March of 2024 that will hopefully alleviate some of that burden.

Beyond the day-to-day operations of the Town, the Board continues to work on some of the longer-term issues our community faces. As Seabrook and Exeter grow and develop, stresses are placed on our shared aquifers, requiring us to remain vigilant and proactive in partnership with the state on monitoring the impact on water supplies for residents. Our fire and police departments face ongoing infrastructure problems that will need to be addressed in the coming years, and the Library will soon require renovation and expansion. Additionally, the Town's Master Plan is due for updating. Lots of work to do, but we are confident the people of Kensington will continue to meet each challenge with optimism and cooperation.

It's been our pleasure and honor to serve you for the last year.

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Deliberative Session Procedures

DELIBERATIVE SESSION RULES OF PROCEDURE

Kensington is an SB2 Community, where Town meeting business is conducted in two sessions.

The first session, in early February, is termed the deliberative session, the second is the annual ballot vote, the second Tuesday in March.

Warrant articles are presented by the Board of Selectmen, The Planning Board, and by petition from citizens

The Moderator is tasked with conducting the meeting, fielding questions from voters, and being the facilitator of debate.

In this meeting, voters are acting as the legislative body of Town government. As debate occurs, all voters are reminded that the manner and tone of speaking should be respectful and relevant to the article that is being presented. Personal attacks, discussion beyond the warrant article and disruptive behavior will not be allowed.

Planning Board articles go directly to the Ballot and are not able to be amended by the voters at the deliberative session. Discussion is allowed, and questions may be answered by Planning Board members.

All other Warrant articles are subject to the Deliberative session procedures.

Warrant articles at the deliberative meeting will be acted on as follows:

The proponent of a warrant article will be asked to discuss the article

Debate will be encouraged from the voters present. Each speaker is allowed 5 minutes and speaking a second time is allowed after all others have been given their opportunity.

To speak, you must be recognized by the Moderator, and shall state your name and address, and speak into the microphone at the podium provided. Except for points of order, the Moderator will not recognize speakers unless standing at the microphone or speaking into a handheld microphone.

Warrant articles may be amended from the floor; however, any amendment must be in written form, presented to the moderator. Amendments may not change the intent of the original warrant.

Amendments must be made by motion and require a second to be considered.

Amendments, if carried, will be placed on the ballot in lieu of the original warrant article. If the amendment is defeated, the original article will go to the ballot.

At the conclusion of the above procedure, the meeting will move to the next warrant article.

After the discussion, debate and amendments are complete, the warrant, presented as written, or amended by the voters present, will be presented to the March Ballot vote.

2023 Deliberative Session Minutes

Kensington Town Deliberative Session February 8, 2023 – 6:45pm KES - Paul A. Flynn Multi-Purpose Room

In attendance: Moderator Harold Bragg, Selectman Joe Pace, Selectman Bob Solomon, Selectman Bob Gustafson, Fire Chief Jon True, Police Chief Scott Cain, Road Agent Matthew Armstrong, Town Clerk Sarah Wiggin and approximately 35 residents.

Harold Bragg opened the meeting at 6:42pm and described the procedures for the Deliberative Session. He explained the Town Vote will be on March 14, 2023. Further detail was noted that there are no citizen petitions on the ballot. It was also noted that the Police Chief and Fire Chief are not town residents and asked that they have permission to speak as non-residents. There were no objections.

Article 01 Elect Officials

To choose all necessary Town Officials for the year ensuing

There was no discussion on Article 1.

Article 02 Amend Article IX

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article IX. Amendments, Conflicts and Penalties, Administration, Severability and Effective Date, section 9.1.4 Enforcement, to read:

"The Board of Selectmen, or their agent, shall be responsible for the enforcement of the provisions and conditions of the Town of

Kensington Zoning Ordinance and any permits that are granted from the above town land use boards."

There is no tax impact for this article.

It was noted that Planning Board Articles have already gone through the Public Hearing process and they cannot be debated.

There was no discussion of Article 2. Article 2 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 03 Amend Section 6.1.6C

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows:

Delete existing language in Article VI Wetlands and Hydric Soils Conservation District, Section 6.1.6.C to be replaced with: "No structure shall be constructed within 100 feet of Hydric A soils."

There is no tax impact for this warrant article.

There was no discussion of Article 3. Article 3 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 04 Amend Section 6.1.6D

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows:

Delete existing language in in Article VI Wetlands and Hydric Soils Conservation District, Section 6.1.6.D to be replaced with "No structure shall be constructed within 50 feet of Hydric B soils."

There is no tax impact with this warrant article.

There was no discussion of Article 4. Article 4 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 05 Amend Section 3.2.3 Accessory Dwelling Units

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows:

Delete existing language in Article III Establishment of District and Uses, Section 3.2.3 Accessory Dwelling Units. Paragraph 3.2.3.4.g and replaced with the following:

The applicant for a permit to construct an accessory dwelling unit shall make adequate. provisions for water supply and sewage disposal for the accessory dwelling unit in accordance with RSA 485-A:38, but separate systems shall not be required for the principal and accessory dwelling units. In order to comply with this paragraph and prior to constructing an accessory dwelling unit, an application for approval for a sewage disposal system shall be submitted in accordance with RSA 485-A as applicable. The approved sewage disposal system shall be installed if the existing system has not received construction approval and approval to operate under current rules or predecessor rules, or the system fails or otherwise needs to be repaired or replaced.

In order to determine if an existing State-approved septic system is properly functioning, the property owner shall have the system inspected by a NH licensed septic inspector and provide a report of the inspection results at the time of application for an accessory dwelling unit.

There is no tax impact with this article.

There was no discussion of Article 5. Article 5 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 06 Replacing existing Article III, Section 3.3C Home Occupations

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows:

Replace existing Article III Establishment of District and Uses, Section 3.3.C Special Exceptions for Home Occupations with the following:

Delete existing section 3.3. C. Special Exceptions for Home Occupations

Add new section 3.2.4 Home Occupations

- Home Occupations as defined in this ordinance are permitted in this district subject to the following rules.
- a) Persons proposing a home occupation under the below conditions shall apply to the Planning Board for a Site Plan Review. The Planning Board has the sole responsibility for determining the degree with which a home occupation will adhere to the requirements

of the site plan review regulations.

- b) Where permitted within a single dwelling unit and only by the person or persons maintaining a dwelling therein who are permanent residents of the Town of Kensington.
- c) Evidence of use: The home occupation shall not display or create outside the dwelling any evidence of home occupation except a permitted sign not to exceed four
- (4) square feet in area. (Requires a sign permit)
- d) Extent of use: The home occupation shall not utilize more than twenty-five (25) percent of the gross floor area (including basement) of the dwelling unit.
- e) Permitted use: such home occupation use is clearly incidental and secondary to the use
 of the dwelling unit for residential purposes and that adequate provisions are made for
 off street parking.
- f) Any change in the nature of the grounds upon which the original approval was granted, including change of ownership, requires a re-application and a new public hearing for site review before the planning board as provided. (Adopted 03/1994)
- g) No more than one (1) commercial vehicle may be kept overnight at the premises.
- h) If the home occupation meets all the standards of this section and creates no external changes, no sign is required and no business-related traffic results from the activity, then no Planning Board review is required.

There is no tax impact with this warrant article.

Mike Schwotzer, 49 Cottage Road, as a member of the Planning Board wished to speak to highlight the importance of this article. He explained that this would simplify the process for a Special Exception needing to go before the Zoning Board as well as the Planning Board as it is currently a 2 step process. He added that if this is to pass, if all the standards are met, that this helps the homeowner as well as the Town.

Fred Feldman, 20 Rose Petal Lane asked if this will impact existing homes and for clarification on section (d). Mr. Schwotzer explained that yes, every home would be covered in this reformatting. Further, that section (d) was a calculation of living space and what would be allowable.

There was no further discussion and Article 6 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 07 Operating Budget

Shall the Town of Kensington raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$2,464,571 (two million four hundred sixty-four thousand five hundred and seventy-one dollars? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$2,327,010 (two million three hundred twenty-seven thousand and ten dollars). The governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The proposed operating budget is an increase of \$137,561 from the budget adopted last year of \$2,327,010. The net estimated impact is \$.34 per thousand dollars of valuation. (Thirty four cents per thousand dollars of valuation.)

Joe Pace, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, offered that the Board was very cognizant of the inflation rates on the town. He added that with these pressures it was also important to retain the knowledge and assets that the town has and work to retain employees. This was a best effort to maintain funding adequate to current operations. A large portion of the budget is allocated to areas like Payroll, Health Insurance, Retirement, Solid Waste and Road Maintenance.

There was no further discussion. Article 7 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 08 Re-Adopt the Optional Veterans' Tax Credit under RSA 72:28, II

Shall the Town vote to re-adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, II, the Optional Veterans' Tax Credit in the amount of \$500.00? If re-adopted, the following individuals will be eligible for the Veteran's Tax Credit: (a) every resident of this state who is a veteran, as defined by RSA 21:50, and who served not less than 90 days on active service in the armed forces of the United States in any qualifying war or armed conflict listed in RSA 72:28, V and continues to serve or was honorably discharged or an officer who continues to serve or was honorably separated from service; or the spouse or surviving spouse of such resident, (b) every resident of this state who was terminated from the armed forces because of a service-connected disability; or the surviving spouse of such resident; and (c) the surviving spouse of any resident who suffered a service-connected death. This tax credit shall replace and shall not be in addition to the standard veteran's tax credit and shall be subtracted in accordance with RSA 72:28, III. The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is not known.

Joe Pace, Chairman of the Board, added that the changes made by State Legislature with new language is an important reason why this Article needs to be adopted. The tax impact is not known as there is not yet an understanding of how many of these credits would be granted.

Jim Thompson, 53 Osgood Road, asked what is the difference between this Article and Article 9?

Kathleen Felch, Town Administrator, added that this Article was specific to Veterans who served during a conflict, while Article 9 covers any veteran who served.

Mike Schwotzer, 49 Cottage Road, inquired to ask if there was a rough estimate of how many people this might apply to. Kathleen Felch shared approximately 70 people based on existing documentation. Mr. Schwotzer then added, a safe estimate of \$35,000 would be the impact.

There was no further discussion. Article 8 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 09 Re-Adopt All Veterans' Tax Credit under RSA 72:28-b.

Shall the Town vote to re-adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28-b, the All Veterans' Tax Credit? If re-adopted, the credit will be available to any resident of the state who is a veteran as defined in RSA 21:50, or the spouse or surviving spouse of any such resident, who (1) served not less than 90 days on active service in the armed forces of the United States and (2) continues to serve or was honorably discharged or an officer who continues to serve or was honorably separated from services and (3) is not eligible for or receiving a credit under RSA 72:28 or RSA 72:35. If adopted, the credit granted will be \$500.00, the same amount as the standard or optional veterans' tax credit voted by the Town under RSA 72:28. This tax credit shall be subtracted in accordance with RSA 72:28-b, III. This article shall be contingent on the passage of Article 8. If the Town Meeting votes "no" on Article 8, this Article shall be null and void. The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is not known.

Moderator Harold Bragg highlighted the clerical correction that the Article should read "contingent on the passage of Article 8". Not Article 4, as was printed. He further added that is Article 8 fails, Article 9 will be null and void.

There was no further discussion. Article 9 will go to the Ballot with the edit as noted.

Article 10 Road Reconstruction

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000 (two hundred thousand dollars) for road reconstruction and maintenance of town roads. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation as per RSA 32.7, VI and will not lapse until December 31, 2024. This is in addition to the operating budget article.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$0.495 per \$1,000 valuation. (forty-nine point five cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Matthew Armstrong, Road Agent, summarized the Article. He stated that the funds would be used to serve Kimball Road, Osgood Road and if funds allowed Cottage Road would receive a layer of Overlayment.

Mike Schwotzer, 49 Cottage Road, added that this article had no tax impact because the \$200,000 amount was consistent from last year.

John Andrews, 14 French's Lane, asked how it was determined which roads would be addressed. Matt clarified; it was largely based on usage. There was a traffic study performed with a car counter that showed the approximate 1000 cars per day on Drinkwater and Wild Pasture Roads. French's Lane is largely only the residents of that neighborhood. Mr. Andrews voiced his concern that French's Lane only has the base coat and it is starting to show signs of wear and deterioration. The Road Agent stated that he would look into that.

Fred Feldman, 20 Rose Petal Lane, asked if all of the \$200,000 from last year was spent. Mr. Armstrong explained that all but about \$11,000 had been spent.

Larry Dorr, 6 Moulton Ridge Road, stated that the wording of the Article sounded like an increase in taxation for those not at Deliberative Session. Joe Pace, Chairman of the Board expressed that the board is aware and frustrated by the requirement of the language, however the decision was to note the tax impact. Moderator Bragg asked if Mr. Dorr would like to propose an edit, Mr. Dorr declined.

Mike Schwotzer, 49 Cottage Road, added a suggestion that because the Article is the same amount as the previous year, perhaps there could be a statement in the body of the article indicating no new tax impact. It was discussed to be taken under advisement by the board.

Fred Feldman, 20 Rose Petal Lane, questioned if the Article were to be turned down, would the budget need to find \$200,000 extra to make up for it, or would the work not be completed. It was further discussed that such work would be delayed if the Article did not pass. This Article falls under a Capital Budget change which requires a warrant article. This is separate from the working budget that would cover smaller jobs of maintenance.

There was no further discussion. Article 10 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 11 Appropriate Funds to Fire and Emergency Services

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75,000 (seventy-five thousand dollars) to be placed in the Fire and Emergency Services Capital Reserve Fund. These funds to be used for the purchase, repair, upgrade, overhaul and/or retrofit of fire vehicles, apparatus, equipment, and related services. This is in addition to the operating budget article.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.185 per \$1,000 valuation. (eighteen point five cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Fire Chief Jon True summarized the Article and explained how the cost of Fire Trucks have significantly increased

There was no further discussion. Article 11 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 12 Evaluation of parcels for town acquisition

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$75,000 (seventy-five thousand dollars) for the purpose of evaluating parcels for potential town acquisition related to needed new facilities for Public Safety and Emergency Services. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation as per RSA 32.7, VI and will not lapse until December 31, 2024.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.185 per \$1,000 valuation. (eighteen point five cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Mike Schwotzer, 49 Cottage Road, asked for explanation of the \$75,000. Joe Pace, Chairman of the Board summarized that the cost would support environmental assessment, deed inquiries, and efforts of due diligence to fully vet any opportunities regarding acquisition of land.

June Hampe, 53 Osgood Road, inquired about Town Parcels of land that might be used. Peter Merrill, inquired about the town parcels that might be appropriate for this proposed use. Joe Pace, Chairman of the Board, added the parcels of town land were not appropriate sue to size and otherwise not suitable for such a project.

There was no further discussion. Article 12 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 13 Tuition Reimbursement and Training for Police Department

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$30,000 (thirty thousand dollars) to be placed into the Police Public Safety Revolving Fund. These funds to be used for specialty training, training instructor incentives, tuition reimbursement and educational incentives for Kensington Police Department employees.

The board of selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.074 per \$1,000 valuation. (seven point four cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Police Chief Cain summarized the article. He explained that the goal of this article is to create a future for Kensington regarding recruitment and retention of officers. This would include but not be limited to Instructor Incentives that will further education of the department. This will allow Kensington to stay competitive which is difficult in the current economic climate. Chairman Pace added that recruitment is difficult and this exercise to improve retention is an investment in the officers who are already here.

There was no further discussion. Article 13 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 14 Appropriate Funds to the Police Public Safety Revolving Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise an appropriate \$25,000 (twenty-five thousand dollars) to be placed into the Police Public Safety Revolving Fund for the purchase of police department items and related services.

The board of selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.062 per \$1000 valuation. (Six point two cents per thousand dollars of valuation.)

Chief Cain summarized the Article. He explained that this was built as a way to address unanticipated costs of investigations. Currently relying on resources from other agencies that need to be reimbursed. Many of the resources necessary have rising costs.

Mike Schwotzer, 49 Cottage Road, asked if the funds through the Cruiser Fund could be used. It was explained that that fund is exclusive to Cruiser expenditures. This proposed fund is a new fund.

There was no further discussion. Article 14 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 15 Grange Hall Maintenance and Repairs

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of up to \$13,000 (thirteen thousand dollars) for maintenance on the Grange Hall. The funds will be used for, but not limited to, structural repairs to

the roof, painting the remaining exterior elevations, annual maintenance such as pest control, heating system maintenance, and water testing, and any unforeseen repairs as the roof structure is rehabilitated.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.032 per \$1,000 valuation. (three point two cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Frank Whittemore, 5 Hobbs Road, summarized the Article as a Grange Trustee.

There was no discussion. Article 15 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 16 Add to Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 (eight thousand dollars) to be added to the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund. This is the first of four annual installments, which will be used to pay the assessor's cost for the State of NH required revaluation due next in 2028. This is in addition to the operating budget article.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.019 per \$1,000 valuation. (one point nine cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Chairman Pace explained that every 5 years the town participates in the exercise to re-evaluate properties, to ensure even distribution of taxes. This is to avoid sharp changes in property assessment and relative taxes.

There was no further discussion. Article 16 will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 17 Acceptance of Land

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Select Board to accept two gifts of land, identified as map 17 lot 16 owned by Deborah and Lee Hearn (wetlands within the Great Meadows) consisting of 5 acres, and map 17 lot 23 owned by Peter Kuegel (wetlands within the Great Meadows) consisting of 5 acres. The purpose of the gifts is to ensure the permanent protection of these parcels through conservation which will provide protection of wildlife habitat and scenic enjoyment by the general public.

Further, to raise and appropriate up to \$2,000 (two thousand dollars) to offset the cost of the ownership transfer.

The board of selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.004 per \$1,000 valuation. (zero point four cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

There was no discussion on Article 17. This article will go to the Ballot as presented.

Article 18 Appropriation to Fire and Emergency Services CRF-earned income.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 (one thousand five hundred dollars) to be placed in the Fire and Emergency Services Capital Reserve Fund. This amount is to come from Unassigned Fund Balance and represents the total of all permit fees and inspections received by

Kensington Fire Rescue throughout 2022. These funds will be earmarked for the purchase, repair, upgrade, overhaul and/or retrofit of fire vehicles, apparatus, equipment, and related services.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

This article has no tax impact.

Moderator Bragg noted that there was a necessary edit to reflect the year 2022 instead of 2021.

There was no further discussion of Article 18. This article will go to the Ballot with the correct edit.

Article 19 Social Services Request for Waypoint

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,100 (Two Thousand One Hundred Dollars) for Waypoint's youth and family support. Waypoint (Previously Richie McFarland Children's Center) provides early intervention programs that serve children from birth to three years of age and their families, services for youth experiencing homelessness, support for families with children with a chronic illness, and family and children programming. This investment will increase family stability, promote socialization in families, enhance child development, and provide concrete support in times of crisis to youth and families in Kensington. This is a special warrant article.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.005 per \$1,000 valuation. (zero point five cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Moderator Bragg noted the clerical error 'serves' but should be 'serve'.

There was no further discussion of this article. Article 19 will go to ballot with the correct edit.

Article 20 Social Services Request for Rockingham Community Action

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 (one thousand five hundred dollars) to Rockingham Community Action for the purpose of providing financial assistance, budgeting education & support to Kensington residents in crisis to move them toward self-sufficiency. This is a special warrant article.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.003 per \$1000 valuation. (Zero point three cents per thousand dollars of valuation.)

There was no discussion on Article 20.

Article 21 Social Services Request for Meals on Wheels

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$988 (nine hundred eighty-eight dollars) to Meals on Wheels for the purpose of providing meals and safety services to qualified Kensington residents. Our services helped 4 (four) Kensington residents and provided them 892 meals and wellness checks. The town support makes a difference. This is a special warrant article.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.002 per \$1000 valuation. (Zero point two cents per thousand dollars of valuation.)

Fred Feldman, 20 Rose Petal Lane, spoke to commend the Board on the ability to serve the town so effectively with such little cost. Chairman Pace added that this was a shared effort by surrounding Towns and the needs expressed by the Meals on Wheels organization.

Article 02 AMEND BUILDING ORDINANCE SECTION 8.1.A.1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Kensington zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article VIII, Building Ordinance, Section 8.1, Building (Permits, A.1) to read:

A new structure, addition, decks, remodeling, or manufactured building when the value exceeds \$3000. The value shall be based on labor costs (including the value of self-provided labor), material costs, and other costs, excluding land; the remainder of the section remains unchanged.

Article 03 AMEND BUILDING ORDINANCE SECTION 8.1.B.1

Article 04 AMEND THE FLOOD PLAIN ORDINANCE ARTICLE V SECTION

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Kensington zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article V, Special Use Standards, Section 5.3 {Floodplain Management Ordinance}: The planning Board must make amendments to the existing ordinance to add, among other items, language regarding newly defined AE zones in town, and to remove language that has been deleted from the federal model ordinance over the years.

Article 05 AMEND DEFINITION OF LIVING AREA

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Kensington zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article II, Definitions, by adding the following:

Living Area: Interior space that is used for living, sleeping, eating, cooking, bathing, washing, or sanitation purposes. Living Area is measured from the interior face of the exterior walls of the dwelling unit. Specifically:

- With respect to stand-alone dwelling units (including detached Accessory Dwelling Units), Living Area is measured from the interior face of the structure's exterior walls.
- With respect to dwelling units that have one or more shared walls (including attached Accessory Dwelling Units and multi-family apartments), Living Area is measured from the interior face of the walls that define the dwelling unit, whether those walls are exterior walls or shared walls.

This article has no tax impact.

Article 06 AMEND DEFINITION OF CONDOMINIUM

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Kensington zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article II, Definitions, by adding the following:

Condominium: A fee interest in land or buildings owned by a unit owner, together with an undivided interest in the common areas of facilities. Condominiums can include single-family or multi-family dwellings and a condominium unit owners' association shall govern the operation of the condominium. The creation of a condominium shall be considered a subdivision entitled to regulation by the town under RSA 356-B:5.

This article has no tax impact.

Article 07 MODIFY THE ELDERLY EXEMPTION CRITERIA

Shall the town modify the provisions of RSA 72:39-a for elderly exemption from property tax in the Town of Kensington, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$175,000 for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years,\$200,000; for a person 80 years of age or older \$220,000.

To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least 5 consecutive years.

In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$42,000 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$63,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$300,000 excluding the value of the person's residence. (Majority vote required)

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact on this article is unknown.



Article 08 MODIFY VETERAN'S CREDIT

Shall the town modify the Veteran's Tax and All Veteran's Tax Credit in accordance with RSA 72:28, II, from its current tax credit of \$500 (five hundred dollars) per year to \$750 (seven hundred fifty dollars)? (Majority vote required)

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact is unknown on this article.

Article 09 MODIFY SERVICE CONNECTED DISABILITY

Shall the town modify the Service-Connected Total Disability Tax Credit in accordance with RSA 72:35, from its current tax credit of \$700 (seven hundred dollars) per year to \$1400 (fourteen hundred dollars)? (Majority vote required)

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact is unknown on this article.

Article 10 OPERATING BUDGET

Shall the Town of Kensington raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$2,603,198 (two million six hundred three thousand one hundred and ninety-eight dollars)? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$2,463,083 (two million four hundred sixty-three thousand and eighty-three dollars). The governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X, and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (Majority Vote Required.)

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The proposed operating budget is an increase of \$138,627 from the budget adopted last year of \$2,464,571. The net estimated impact is \$.20 per thousand dollars of valuation. (twenty cents per thousand dollars of valuation.)

Article 11 COMMUNITY POWER PLAN ADOPTION

Should the Town adopt the Kensington Community Power Plan, authorize the Board of Selectmen to implement the Plan, and take all action in furtherance thereof, pursuant to RSA 53-E? The Kensington Community Power Plan is an opt-out program that offers more flexible electricity procurement. The Plan will initially provide lower electricity rates for residents, or it will not launch. Initial participation in the plan can be declined, after which enrollment becomes voluntary.

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

Article 12 ROAD RECONSTRUCTION

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000 (two hundred thousand dollars) for road reconstruction and maintenance of town roads. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation as per RSA 32.7, VI and will not lapse until December 31, 2025. This is in addition to the operating budget article. (Majority Vote Required.)

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$0.294 per \$1,000 valuation. (twenty-nine point four cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Article 13 APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES C

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25,000 (twenty five thousand dollars) to be placed in the Fire and Emergency Services Capital Reserve Fund. These funds to be used for the purchase, repair, upgrade, overhaul and/or retrofit of fire vehicles, apparatus, equipment, and related services. This is in addition to the operating budget article. (Majority Vote Required.)

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article is \$.037 per \$1,000 valuation. (three point seven cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Article 14 APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE POLICE SAFETY REVOLVING F

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$15,000 (fifteen thousand dollars) to be placed into the Police Public Safety Revolving Fund. These funds to be used for specialty training, training instructor incentives, tuition reimbursement and educational incentives for Kensington Police Department employees. (Majority Vote Required.)

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article will be an increase of \$.022 per \$1,000 valuation. (two point two cents per thousand dollars of valuation)

Article 15 APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE POLICE SAFETY REVOLVING F

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$15,000 (fifteen thousand dollars) to be placed into the Police Public Safety Revolving Fund for the purchase of police department items and related services. (Majority Vote Required.)

The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommend this article.

The tax impact of this article will be an increase of \$.022 per \$1000 valuation. (two point two cents per thousand dollars of valuation.)



Article 16 ADD FUNDS TO REVALUATION CRF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,907 (nine thousand nine hundred and seven dollars) to be added to the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund to come from the unassigned fund balance. The Kensington Police Department pride ourselves on professionalism based on our officers being dedicated to public safety, approachability and community orientated. We continue to provide proactive policing service to the Kensington community. In 2023 we have responded to 5,925 calls for service. This year we conducted 793 directed patrols, 1,249 motor vehicle warnings, and issued 579 traffic citations. Motor vehicle accidents increased 44% from 2022. Technology arguably accounts for the majority of distractions encountered while driving that contribute to motor vehicle accidents. This was the second year we applied to the New Hampshire Office of Highway Safety for grant patrols and were awarded Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over, Speed patrol shifts and Distracted Driver patrol shifts. These grants continue to put extra patrols on the roads to enforce all traffic laws to help maintain safe roads for our community.

2023 was a year of progress after dealing with the Covid-19 Pandemic. Finally after ordering new pursuit vehicles for the fleet over two (2) years ago. The vehicles finally arrived from Foss Motors. These vehicles are replacing the worn-out existing vehicles: 2017 Chevrolet Tahoe and two (2) 2018 Dodge Chargers that had to be removed from service this summer due to safety concerns and mechanical failures. There was slight setback getting the vehicles outfitted with the proper police equipment. The new vehicles do not come from the factory equipped with the necessary needs to be an operational police cruiser. The vehicles were sent to Adamson Industries and Global Public Safety. The Covid-19 pandemic still has some grasp with supply and demand as many of the parts to outfit these vehicles have been backordered from the manufacturer. In December two (2) of the four (4) vehicles were completed and put into service.

The Kensington Police has seen a dramatic increase of calls for service involving mental health issues within the community. Many of the mutual aid calls to surrounding police agencies have been mental health related in their communities as well. These type of calls range from attempted suicide, acts of violence, threatening harm to others, protective custody, Involuntary Emergency Admissions (IEA), harassment and intoxicated subjects. Knowing how to recognize that a person is in crisis and de-escalate a situation can be the key to preventing a tragedy. The State of New Hampshire does not have a red flag law. This law allows law enforcement and family members to petition the court for a judge to order firearms to be removed from someone who poses a risk of hurting themselves or someone else and preventing someone from obtaining a firearm. In 2024, we are focused on providing the Kensington Police staff with more training in Crisis Intervention Training (CIT).

The State of New Hampshire continues to experience a problem with recruiting police officers and as a result, many of the surrounding police agencies are short-staffed. Over that past couple years we have strived to achieve full staffing within our agency. This year was the first year of offering tuition reimbursement for further education and specialty training. This program is an important step in supporting our efforts to retain high-qualitied officers. Tuition reimbursement gives you a leg up in the talent saving you recruitment costs and unnecessary employee turnover. Retention of our current officers and staff and keeping our team together has been a priority. We can say we are currently at full staff capacity.

The Kensington Police Department did say goodbye to Detective William Paskowski. Detective Paskowski served three (3) years with the Kensington Police, prior to working in Kensington he served three (3) years with the Raymond Police Department. Detective Paskowski decided to move his family back to his routes in New York, where he obtained a new police position with the Bethel Connecticut Police Department. We wish him and his family good luck and he will be missed. Officer Joe Scutellaro was promoted to the Detective position in April. Officer Justin Miedico was assigned to the Seacoast Emergency Response Team (SERT). This is a special operations unit most would recognize as SWAT. The SERT team is comprised of highly trained officers from 14 New Hampshire seacoast police agencies that have been selected to handle incidents that would require operations above and beyond the normal capabilities of regular police functions. The team members are on call 24 hours a day 365 days a year to respond to critical incidents such as Hostage Situations, Armed Barricaded Suspects, High Risk Warrants, Woodland Searches or any other emergency situation that arises in the Seacoast area.

We are pleased to announce the addition of three (3) veteran police officers. Officer James Collier is a full-time certified police officer who served for the Newton Police Department for three (3) years. Officer Collier fills the open full-time position from Detective Paskowski resignation. Officer David Harney served as a military police officer for four (4) years and for the Lynn Massachusetts Police for 28 years. Officer Harney retired last January from the Lynn Police Department and obtained his New Hampshire part-time police certification in 2023. We are excited to announce the hiring of Michael Munck. He will serve as a part-time Detective and assist Detective Scutellaro with investigations. Detective Munck served for the Exeter Police Department from 1998 to 2022. During his tenure with the Exeter Police he held many positions and investigated some high profile criminal cases. He held the position of Deputy Chief before his retirement. He is currently a part-time instructor and former EMS investigator for the New Hampshire Fire Academy. Detective Munck's leadership and experience is an asset to this agency.

Timely reporting of suspicious or criminal activity is paramount to our success in investigating and solving crimes. Please do not report suspicious or criminal crimes activity to our social media outlets. We do not monitor our social media 24 hours a day. 2023 FIRE/EMS REPORT

Kensington Fire Rescue consists of a paid-on-call department with 19 members that provide suppression, prevention, education, emergency medical care and transport to Kensington and surrounding communities.

Our staff have been training to improve their skills. Firefighter I and Firefighter 2 certifications, basic and advanced Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) and some leadership classes have all helped to make the members provide a better service for you!

Although we tried to purchase a new ambulance, it was becoming more expensive and was going to take over a year to build. We were able to secure a used ambulance with low mileage and it had all the things we needed so we were able to purchase, outfit and put it in service for less than half the cost of a new one. All the funding came from our EMS fund, which means no tax dollars were used. The old ambulance will be sold, and funds put aside for future purchases.

Through a state grant we were able to purchase and outfit a Kawasaki UTV and enclosed trailer. Through a private donation we purchased a medical bed system that will allow us to transport patients from fields, arenas, trails or woods to an ambulance quickly and safely.

We will continue to increase our service capability to our customers (you) while doing it in a cost-efficient manner. Please note our budget as you review the annual report.

And call 911 for an emergency. If you have questions or need information about our service, please call 603-772-5751. We want to hear from you about what services you would like to see in the future. Thank you to all who have supported, helped, volunteered, and participated with our team. And a special thank you to all the members who work to keep our town safe!

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

This past year we observed wet weather in late spring and throughout the summer. This led to reduced wildfire activity throughout the state and allowed many of our state firefighting resources to respond to Nova Scotia and Quebec to assist our Canadian neighbors with their record wildfire season. We were also able team up with local fire departments and provide many wildfire trainings throughout the state.

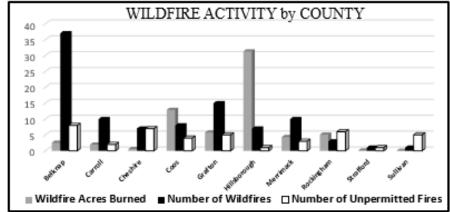
This time of year, we see fires caused by the careless disposal of woodstove ashes. Before dumping your woodstove ashes, you should place them in a covered metal container until they are out cold. Many homes in New Hampshire are in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Every year New Hampshire sees fires which threaten or destroy structures, a constant reminder that wildfires burn more than just trees. Even with the lower wildfire threat in New Hampshire in 2023, properties within the Wildland Urban Interface were still impacted, with 8 structures threatened and 3 destroyed by wildfires. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildfire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe! We ask everyone to remember Smokey's message about personal responsibility and follow his ABC's: Always Be Careful with fire. If you start a fire, put it out when you are done. "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!"

As we prepare for the 2024 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting www.NHfirepermit.com. The burning of household waste is prohibited



by the Air Resources Division of the Department of Environmental Services. You are encouraged to contact the local fire department for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. Thank you for helping us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. 2023 EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REPORT

Kensington Emergency Management is a local emergency response organization that helps to manage local, regional, state, and federal resources within our community. Our members include the Select Board, FD, PD, KES, and other agencies as well as local members of the community who plan and provide for potential emergencies. We also assist with mitigation and recovery efforts.

In 2024 we will be doing multiple drills to test our capabilities to manage and handle various scenarios including a problem at Seabrook Station power plant, an earthquake, plane crash and law enforcement-related hostile based actions. These drills can include multiple Town and State agencies. It is always good to plan and train together so if an event occurs, we have relationships and will work together to manage an event quickly.

2023 Kensington Public Library Report

Adults Events:

We had over 20 evening events for the community with topics ranging from raptors, local history, local authors, adventure, and art as well as craft making events. Some of the events were via "zoom" while others were in person.

The monthly book club continued Tuesday evenings at the library and Wednesday at noon at Eastman's Corner.

Children's Events:

Our children's librarian, Kristin, provided a lot of fun and educational activities for the kindergarten to grade 5 children every Thursday after school. She also added a second pre-school story time on Thursday afternoons.

The annual summer reading program was popular with 100 elementary age kids and over 90 teens and adults signing up. We began the summer with a magician at KES's Field Day followed up with 6 more evening events and performers and ended with the annual ice cream social at Sawyer Park. Thanks to the Friends of the Library for helping us fund some of these events for the kids.

Library Statistics:

Visits: We had 824 more library visits in 2023 than in 2022.

Circulation: Our physical circulation of books, DVDs and audios increased by 1034 for the year 2023 from 2022, while e-books and audiobooks streaming increased by 535 for a total of 1569 more materials checked out in the year 2023.

Museums: The number of museum passes handed out in 2023 (50) doubled from those handed out in 2022 (26.)

Interlibrary loan: The number of materials we lent to other libraries as well as the number we borrowed increased from 2022.

Dana Delotto continued her work on the inter-library loan system whereby we order books for patrons that our library doesn't carry, as well as multiple copies of our monthly book club selections.

Future Planning:

The library needs more room to accommodate the increase in demand for both children and adult events. We had many meetings with the Social Trustees, Public Trustees and the architects in planning a proposed library addition. Next year we will be focused on presenting our ideas for the future of the library to the public.

Fundraisers: The Friends had another successful book and bake sale on the weekend of Old Home days. They were also able to form a non-profit partnership with Ocean Gaming Casino in Hampton Beach which proved profitable.

We were so grateful to many in town for their help: Harold Bragg, Skip and Cindy Heal, Down to Earth Landscapes, the Friends of the Library, the Kensington Fire Department and Police Department. And, of course, all of Kensington for their support and patronage.

Road Manager Report

Road Manager Report

Year 2023 started off active with multiple winter storms. While most storms lacked significant amounts of snow, they were persistent in delivering sleet and freezing rain; resulting in a substantial amount of sand and salt to mitigate. Winter maintenance contracts were extended for both B&S Disposal and Matrix Inc. Winter materials were provided by Morton Salt and Merrill Construction.

Early Spring brought a need to regrade the few gravel roads in town. Hickory Lane and New Boston Road were resurfaced with new material by Bell & Flynn's grader. Excessive rain contributed to the flooding of Moulton Ridge Road requiring the culvert outlet protection area to be repaired.

As warmer weather set in, roadside mowing was completed by Sewall Enterprises. Several drainage improvements were made in town by Matrix Inc. including a culvert upgrade on Osgood Road prior to paving. Bell & Flynn was awarded the contract for road reconstruction to overlay Osgood and Kimball Roads along with new gravel shoulders.

The above average precipitation continued into the Fall along with severe storms knocking down trees and power lines. Restoration efforts included the removal and disposal of debris left in the town's right of way. 2023 concluded to be one of the warmest years bringing record setting rainfall.

Trustees of the Trust Funds Report

Report of the Town of Kensington, Trustees of Trust Funds

Fiscal Year 2023

The Trustees of the Trust Funds are the custodians of the town's perpetual care funds, charitable trusts and capital reserve/expendable trust funds. In the case of privately donated funds, The Trustees of the Trust funds determine the expenditure of these funds based on the wishes of the donor. The Trustees of the Trust Funds also release capital reserve funds and expendable trust funds to the appropriate government officials upon request. The Trustees of the Trust Funds make decisions on how these funds are to be invested based upon the statutes and investment policy adopted by the trustees. Source: Charitable Trusts Unit, Department of Justice, State of New Hampshire (2017) Handbook for Trustees of Trust Funds.

The Town of Kensington Capital Reserve Funds and Common Trust Funds were invested on behalf of the Town by *Three Bearings Fiduciary Advisors* based on the Trustee of the Trust Funds Investment Policy. During the Year ending 2023, the total market value increased by \$17,849.02 compared to the balance on December 31, 2022. The total market value of the funds ending December 31, 2023 is \$726,042.45.

During Fiscal Year 2023, The Perpetual Care and the Perpetual Care and for the Good of Cemetery received donations. The Fire and Emergency Services and Revaluation Capital Reserve Funds received funding as per 2023 warrant articles. The Special Education and School Building Repair and Maintenance Expendable Trust Funds also received funding per 2023 warrant articles.

Two past and current students were recipients of scholarship awards from the John W. & Jesse E. York and Bessie B. & Faith N. York Scholarship funds.

Cemetery Trustees Report

This year, the cemetery trustees approved official cemetery bylaws for the town of Kensington. These bylaws are now posted on the cemetery page on the town website. Under previous cemetery policy, the right to burial in the cemetery was only granted at the time of a town resident's death. The new bylaws do make a change to this policy to allow town residents to claim the right to burial in the cemetery in advance. Actual spaces are not granted until someone has a date of interment set, but this change will allow residents in town to make their end-of-life plans in advance.

Royal Green Tree Service did extensive work in both of the town cemeteries this year, taking care of all problem trees in the Upper, Lower, and Dearborn Yard areas. We are grateful to them for their wonderful hard work!

Last May, the cemetery trustees held a community stone cleaning day in the Lower Yard. Town residents came along to help brighten up some of the stones in our first two rows of graves using methods and materials approved by the New Hampshire Old Graveyard Association. The trustees plan to make this an annual event. Notice of it will be posted on the town website, KCC newsletter and town Facebook page.

We would like to extend a big thank-you to York River Landscaping for doing a wonderful job on cemetery mowing this year.

Plans for 2024 include an exploration of adding the option for green burials to the cemetery bylaws. The trustees are currently in a fact-finding phase of this project and will provide opportunities for public input on any changes to cemetery policy.

Grange Hall Trustees Report

On January 26, 2023 Grange Trustees held a Community Roundtable Discussion at the Town Hall. The goal of the discussion was to raise awareness of the Grange as a public space and hear from the public what their ideas might be for using the Grange in the future. It was attended by 23 individuals, with 27 individuals responding to an online questionnaire developed by trustees prior to the event, and several more individuals providing feedback via email, text, and one-on-one conversations with Trustees. All feedback was recorded, summarized, and incorporated into a report issued to the Board of Selectmen in April. Copies were also made available to the public.

In April, Trustees held an Open House at the Grange. The event was well attended, with several people inquiring about the building's history while others commented on the beauty of the building interior.

Encouraged by the response to these two events, Trustees researched rental/use rates for similar comparable buildings in our region. As a result, Trustees recommended revised policies and rates which were approved by the Board of Selectmen and instituted in August of 2023.

In December of 2022, evidence of water damage was discovered impacting the western side roof supporting structure and the ceiling plaster. Repairs were completed by September 2023, with insurance covering the cost of work completed.

Trustees also continued to address previously identified needs:

- Painting the remaining exterior of the building (covered by approved prior year warrant article funding)
- > WIFI installation in the Grange building (Fidium contracted in July 2023)
- > Kitchen Annex roof moss removal
- Insulation of Grange ceiling to extend building use period during the year (partially paid with gifted funds, Fall 2023)

During 2023 requests for use of the Grange Hall were processed; 4 from town affiliated groups, 3 from private parties, and 2 for events open to the public. Uses included events sponsored by Kensington Elementary, Kensington Recreation Committee, and Kensington Fire Association. The annual Friends of the Kensington Library Book Sale was held during Old Home Days. Two new public events were offered this year; the Fall Artist Fair and the Contra Dance. Trustees were pleased to work with sponsors of events and look forward to increased uses in 2024!

During 2023, consideration of the offer by Ms. Elaine Kaczmarek to gift a land parcel behind the Grange to the Town of Kensington for use by the Grange continued. A land survey was completed, and the matter was brought before the Planning Board. On November 15, 2023 the Planning Board approved the Application for a lot line adjustment, contingent on acceptance of the warrant article at the March 2024 Town Meeting. Trustees are looking at options and cost to utilize the land parcel to offer viable parking for Grange events, cemetery and library parking with this gift.

At the close of the 2023 year, Grange Trustees prepared a 2024 Warrant Articles for consideration which would appropriate \$3,950 for 2024 Grange operation and maintenance costs.

As we close this eventful year, we wish to thank all in Kensington and the surrounding communities for working with Kensington Grange Trustees and the Town of Kensington to preserve and promote use of this beautiful building!!!

Conservation Commission Report

Annual Report of the Kensington Conservation Commission for 2023

Throughout 2023 the Commission discussed the following issues:

Land Donation

Two parcels of land were donated to the town. Land owner Peter Kuegel Map 14, Lot 23 located in the Great Meadows and Deborah and Lee Hearn, Map 14, Lot 16, also in the Great Meadows. Kensington has paid for the legal cost of acquiring the lands.

An additional land owner who owns property adjacent to Hodges is interested in selling the property to the town. The Commission is reviewing the costs incurred for lands that have been donated to the town and will be reviewing a cost/value analysis.

Land Use/ Ordinance Issues

The Commission discussed the lack of oversite of the development/timber cut at Wild Pasture Road. The land owner was required to file an after the fact Alteration of Terrain with State of New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services which has been approved.

Land owners contacted the Commission with concerns questions regarding development of properties which involved wetlands. The landowners were directed to contact a wetland specialist/ engineer. Also citizens were concerned with property owners removing beaver dams which is addressed in NH RSA 210:9 and the FAQ section of the Fish and Game website.

The Commission reviewed Unitil the cutting of vegetation on the right of way in the Great Meadows and Eversource replacing a pole of Highland Road. Erosion control will be used and care will be taken to not spread invasive species.

Hodges Conservation Land

The Commission engaged forester Charlie Moreno to update the forest management plan given that there have been two forest management cuts on the property. The forest cuts were to support wildlife and to promote a diverse forest ecology. The updated forest management plan will also include a forest inventory.

Control of Beech Tree Saplings – The Commission discussed Charlie Moreno's suggestion to control beech regrowth from stumps since beech is a strong competitor in the forest canopy. Rather than the use of herbicides on the beech regrowth, the Commission opted for the saplings to be manually cut.

Skip Heal continues to generously volunteer to mow an access trail through the hay field to existing trails which allows access to the property while the hay is tall.

Abutters concerns – a large tree fell crossing into adjacent property. Society for Protection of NH Forests were contacted and did not object to having the tree removed. The town removed the portion of the tree that impacted the abutter's property. Abutters also expressed concern about the extent of beaver activity. Given the beaver deceiver that was installed was not

effective in curtailing the beaver activity, the Commission discussed having the town more involved since beaver activity is a townwide issue. Although beaver activity promotes wildlife habitat and ground water recharge extensive flooding can affect town infrastructure.

Large Groundwater Drawdown Application by the Town of Exeter

Kensington was notified that Exeter is making an application to install a well on land owned by PEA. The Commission suggested that the town should retain the services of an engineer to manage and review data collected by DES as part of the application process. It is understood that this project has been stalled.

Conservation Next Steps - SELT worked with Chris Rider and Exeter, Kensington and East Kingston to conserve 156 acres spanning the three towns along the northern edge of Great Brook which is a primary tributary to the Exeter River. Funding from the three towns in addition to the NH Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund and a significant donation from the land owner is funding the project. Late in 2023 SELT received confirmation that the project was awarded the grant of \$525,000 from the NH Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund. The total projected costs are estimated at \$1,373,000. SELT is making an application for the Great Bay Resource Protection Partnership grant contributing \$15,000, the landowner agreeing to a \$530,000 reduction in purchase price, (known as a bargain sale). The Conservation Commission contributed \$103,000 from the conservation fund. The towns of Exeter and East Kingston also contributed funds to the project.

Planning Board Report

The Planning Board held hearings on and approved eight (8) applications in 2023. The following is a summary of the applications by type:

- 2 Conditional Use Permits Accessory Dwelling Unit: Nelson, Map 5, Lot 5 Approved; Andrews, Map 3, Lot 3-3 – Approved.
- 1 Conditional Use Permit Telecommunications Tower: Vertex Towers, Map 10, Lot 1 Approved
- 1 Site Plan review Telecommunications Towers: Vertex Towers, Map 10, Lot 1 Approved.
- 2 Lot Line Adjustments: Pikul, Map 6 Lot 62 Approved; Kaczmarek, Map 8, Lots 13&14 Approved, contingent on acceptance of the warrant article at the March 2024 town meeting.
- 1 Miscellaneous Provisions Scenic Roads: Unitil (tree cutting) Approved
- 1 Voluntary Lot Merger: HH Backlands LLC, Map 1, Lots 1&2, Map 4, Lot 7-1 Approved.

In addition to these new applications, the Planning Board monitored compliance with conditions of approval for previously approved applications and continued to focus on application process improvement. To this end, the Board approved updated application checklists that provide a more streamlined and easy-to-understand process for applicants. The board also continued its focus on long range planning including the drafting of a Master Plan survey. The Board expects the survey to be released in the coming months and encourages residents to participate.

Always prioritizing ways to provide greater clarity and transparency in our processes and procedures, the Planning Board spent significant time during workshops revising and updating the Board's Rules of Procedure. This update not only provides more clarity on meeting and public hearing procedures for Board members, but also provides greater clarity for applicants. In addition to updates of the Board's Rules of Procedure, residents can expect to see a revision of the town's Site Plan Review in the coming months.

Planning Board workshops continued to be a valuable tool for long range planning and updating of the Town's Land Use Regulations. Workshop meetings will continue to be held in 2024 during the months of February through May, and September through November.

Regular meetings are held on the third Wednesday of the month at 6:30 pm. The Planning Board is currently fully staffed but is in need of alternate members. There are currently 3 open alternate positions. No experience is required and anyone interested is invited to contact the Board's Land Use Administrative Assistant for more information.

We sincerely appreciate the dedicated efforts of our Board members, Land Use Administrative Assistant Owen Corcoran, Selectboard representative Bob Solomon, Town Administrator Kathy Felch, Town Planner Glenn Greenwood of GKG Planning LLC, as well as the Town's boards, committees, and commissions, and the legal and engineering professionals who all help us collectively accomplish our role as the Town's Planning Board.

The Board also appreciates the citizens of the Town of Kensington for their support at the voting booth in implementing the various regulatory changes needed to comply with new State and Federal laws, and in reaction to the myriad of land use issues that are identified over the course of the year.

Zoning Board of Adjustment Report

Town of Kensington Zoning Board of Adjustment 2023 Annual Report

Members: Michael Schwotzer, Chairman; Joan Skews, Vice-Chair;

Public Hearings by Month:

February: Stacy's Tree Service, LLC with property at 149 South Rd. to modify a prior non-conforming use (restaurant) into a new use of a lawn and garden/agricultural supply store.

The ZBA members agreed that this was not an expansion of a non-conforming use. The owner discussed his vision for the property, including types of materials and plants he will stock and sell. The audience listed issues such as parking, highway traffic and outside lighting.

The five criteria for the granting of a variance were reviewed and answered in the correct format. The variance was granted with the following criteria:

- Apply for and receive a Site Plan Review (SPR) from the Planning Board (PB).
- 2. During SPR, the PB is directed to address site lighting so to minimize nighttime light pollution.
- 3. During SPR, PB and applicant are to agree on hours of operation in keeping with Town's Noise Ordinance.
- 4. PB to require traffic study due to business location on Rte. 107.
- 5. Propane sales are limited to bottle exchange only.
- Applicant to supply PB with list of on-site proposed chemicals.

February (Joint meeting with the Planning Board): Vertex Towers representing Marybeth Dinicola of 75 Moulton Ridge Rd. requesting a variance to allow construction of a Telecommunications Facility in the Residential/Agricultural zone.

A lengthy and technical presentation was given by the Vertex representative to both Boards and the public. He was questioned by Board members. After the presentation, the ZBA opened their Public Hearing first as the variance needed to be granted before the PB could begin their deliberations.

The first three variance criteria were discussed individually and were interspersed with comments and observations by the public. When reviewing the 4th criteria, no evidence was given by the public at that time. After that criterion was answered in the correct format, many members of the public made additional comments. A significant number related to the valuation criteria and the lack of notice which did not afford homeowners time to obtain actual data on their properties.

The ZBA members understood that more time was needed for the public to research the valuation question and so continued the meeting until the March joint Planning Board meeting. The only criteria to be discussed at that meeting with he valuation

March (Joint meeting with the Planning Board): Vertex Towers variance hearing continued.

Heritage Commission Chair, L. Munroe, was questioned regarding balloon test views from historical properties. A minimal number of properties had a potential view of the new tower. Also, no new information was received that supported that the values of properties would be diminished.

Variance item number 4 was reexamined and found that due to lack of information, the values of surrounding properties would not be diminished. Item number 5 was discussed, and the Board agreed that there would be an unnecessary hardship for the applicant owing to the special conditions of the property. The Board also found that the variance was necessary for the town to have coverage and that it was for the public benefit.

A motion was made and passed to approve the variance for Vertex Towers to construct a Telecommunications Facility in the Residential/Agricultural zone.

May: the ZBA received eight (8) Requests for Rehearing of the Zoning Board of Adjustment's March 16, 2023, approval to construct a Telecommunications Facility in the Residential/Agricultural zone.

The requests were to be heard based on **Standing** and **Merit**. To have **Standing** the property owner must show proximity to the subject site and immediacy of the injury claimed. To have **Merit** the property owner must specify in the motion the grounds for the rehearing and why the variance was unlawful or unreasonable.

The applicants were given time to speak about their requests during a public comment period. Then the Board reviewed each case using the two bases, Standing and Merit. Below is a table showing the results of that review along with the Board's decision.

Partial Rehearing granted for the purpose of discussing Valuations ONLY.

Date: June 6, 2023

June: A partial rehearing of the Zoning Board of Adjustment's March 16, 2023, approval to construct a Telecommunications Facility in the Residential/Agricultural zone and restricted to Item #4 Valuation.

Mr. F. Parisi, applicant and representative of Vertex Towers, presented a timeline of the application, review of the town's zoning regulations, and supplied appraisals of the property at 66 Moulton Ridge Rd with and without a cell tower. The impact of adding a cell tower was zero dollars in that appraiser's opinion. He also reminded the board of the Telecommunication Act of 1966 requires action on an application within 150 days of filing (December 15, 2022).

Ms. I. Greenberg asked about the Planning Board's prior approval of the Conditional Use permit and the Site Plan review. The Chair explained that both of those decisions were conditional upon the ZBA granting the requested variance. Mrs. A. Smith stated that she and two other property owners were attempting to have property appraisals prepared but they needed additional time. Atty. Hoysradt of McDonald Law and L. Manias of Capital Appraisal Associates spoke to the quality of the presented appraisal that was prepared in a week or so.

Multiple residents spoke in opposition to the requested variance. The public comment period was closed at 9:05 p.m.

2023 ZBA Annual Report

The ZBA members expressed varied and mixed feelings regarding the application. A non-public meeting to confer with Town Counsel was opened and lasted for approximately 20 minutes. The minutes of the non-public meeting were sealed.

Upon advice of counsel, a motion to deny a continuance was made, moved, and passed. The Board members were polled on whether they possessed enough information to determine that a cell tower would not cause a diminution in value to the adjacent properties. The majority agreed that they did have enough information and so a motion to grant the variance was made, moved, and passed.

October and November: PSNH with property off Highland Road for a Special Exception for proposed utility maintenance on the existing 115kV 363 Transmission Line within Kensington's Wetland and Hydric conservation District in accordance with Article VI, Section 6.1.7 of the Kensington Zoning Ordinance.

Eversource Energy explained that it is a maintenance project as one structure needs to be replaced due to deteriorating conditions and damage to a pole and it needs to be replaced to maintain reliability. They will be putting down temporary timber matting to displace the weight of equipment, such as cranes and bucket trucks. The Structure has three poles and requires approximately five different vehicles. They will be getting a wetlands permit through the state and are waiting for a preapplication meeting with NH DES.

The Kensington Conservation Commission (CC) is required under Section 6.1.7B to review the applicant request along with the ZBA. The October meeting was continued for a month to allow for CC's review and comments at their next meeting.

At the November meeting, the application was approved with the following conditions:

- Follow the conditions set forth in the Kensington Conservation Commission letter to adhere to best practices, and to provide imagery and monitor the site for at least two growing seasons for the spread of invasive vegetation.
 - Approval is conditional upon receipt of the Department of Environmental Services or other required permits.

Heritage Commission Report

Heritage Commission Report 2023

The Heritage Commission was able to meet in person at the Town Hall again this year. The meetings were posted by the Town Clerk Sarah Wiggin. The commission meets on the fourth Wednesday of every month at 7, and we encourage public attendance.

Most recently, the Heritage Commission is sponsoring the Nomination of the Town Center Historic District to the National Register of Historic Places. They are working with the NH Division of Historic Places. There will be a public meeting in March to present the district to the town, with representatives from NHDHR to explain the process. The Commission is stressing that listing on the National Register is honorary only and does not impose any restriction on property owners whatsoever.

In the Fall there was a balloon test for a proposed cell tower on Moulton Ridge. The Heritage Commission conducted a review of the visual effect on historic properties and produced a report which was given to the Town and presented at the public hearing.

To help townspeople maintain their historic properties, the commission continued to offer on the following:

- The town's Barn Easement Program. The easement program helps owners of historic
 agricultural buildings abate their taxes, allowing them to maintain the antique barns that
 remain as visual links to our Town's agricultural heritage.
- The commission is glad to visit and talk with property owners who are considering repairs, confronting decisions about, or simply interested in advice about maintaining their historic properties. These visits are made by commission members, that include professional preservationists. We encourage the community to take advantage of this offer for "free advice."

The commission also offers their services to other town bodies and organizations such as:

- Assisting the Planning Board by revising the Historic Resources chapter of the Master Plan when the plan is revised.
- Helping the Conservation Commission identify farmland critical to maintaining the town's agricultural character.
- Working with the Selectmen and Planning Board to review the Plan NH Charrette recommendations for renewed conversations about the Town Center. They are in discussions about hosting a meeting to discuss improvements such as crosswalks, side paths and traffic calming to the roadway in the Town Center.
- The commission has supported the Union Meeting House Trustees to save the building and bring it back to usefulness in the town. The LCHIP project is well underway!
- Offering the Trails Committee help for some interpretive signs for historic trails.
- Working with the Cemetery Trustees on a project to safely clean some of the significant markers.

The commission hopes to:

- Update the Townwide Survey of Historic Architectural Resources.
- Conduct a survey of the interiors of the oldest houses to establish the work of the significant joiners who lived and worked in Kensington in the 18th century.

Throughout the year, the commission has discussed how to recognize and thank those property owners who keep our historic buildings and vistas alive and offer historic markers to some properties. As the town loses more and more historic buildings the commission hopes to be more proactive in reaching out to historic property owners before it is too late. Not everyone who has historically significant property is aware of its value, and may want to make decisions to preserve it with that knowledge.

Kensington Energy Committee Report



This was the year that the Kensington Energy Committee was officially formed after approval by the Board of Selectmen. Our committee saw the appointment of seven total members, inclusive of Rob Gustafson as the board's liaison.

The committee's attention was first taken up by the Community Power initiative which has since taken off after preliminary approval (pending town vote) by the board. We were able to make large strides in both researching the program and its benefits, and doing vendor vetting to ultimately hand off the work to the Kensington Community Power Subcommittee.

Towards the end of the year, we embarked on the first of our town educational projects: a home energy improvement guide to lowering residents' energy bills. The campaign will launch sometime in early 2024 and will include a mix of online videos, physical newspaper articles, and town website links. All of this in an effort to not only reach as many people as possible, but to engage the public in meaningful discussions in all ways, shapes, and forms.

Kensington Community Power Committee Report



This subcommittee was formed with the sole task of researching the NH RSA-53E, a Community Power law that went into effect on October 1, 2019, to see if it would be viable and beneficial for the town of Kensington and its residents. The committee is excited to announce that after much work, we have formally submitted the Kensington Community Power EAP (Energy Aggregation Plan) to the NH PUC (Public Utilities Commission). What this means is that, pending a town vote, the town of Kensington will be allowed to choose a vendor from which to acquire energy in bulk, at potentially lower rates. Since the program is opt-out, with no fees or other obligations, the passing of such a warrant article would simply expand the options for cheaper electricity that residents (and the town) are able to take advantage of.

The committee was also able to make a recommendation to the town board on a vendor, CPCNH (Community Power Coalition of NH). After signing a non-binding Joint Powers agreement, the committee was able to craft a warrant article for the 2024 deliberative session. If the measure is approved in the March town vote, Kensington has the chance to join the Coalition as early as May 2024.

The committee will also plan a social campaign in February 2024 to help the town residents understand all the benefits this program offers.

Adverse Opinion on Governmental Activities

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matters discussed in the Basis for Adverse and Unmodified Opinions section of our report, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly the financial position of the governmental activities of the Town of Kensington, New Hampshire, as of December 31, 2022, or the changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Unmodified Opinion on Each Major Fund and Aggregate Remaining Fund Information

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Kensington, New Hampshire, as of December 31, 2022, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Adverse and Unmodified Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. Presented herewith please find the Management Discussion & Analysis Report for the Town of Kensington for the year ending December 31, 2022. The responsibility for accuracy of the data, the completeness and fairness of this documentation (including all disclosures) rests with management. To the best of our knowledge and belief, the data contained herein is accurate in material aspects. This report and its content have been designed to fairly present the Town's financial position, including the result of operations of all the finds of the Town All the disclosures necessary to enable and to assist the reader in acquiring an accurate understanding of the Town's financial activities have been included.

The Town's management is responsible for establishing accounting and internal control structures designed to ensure that the physical, data, informational, intellectual, and human resource assets of the Town are protected from loss, theft and misuse, and to ensure that adequate accounting information is maintained and reported in conformity wing generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Management also strives to ensure that these assets are put to good and effective use. The internal control structure is designed to provide reasonable assurances that these objectives are affained.

Under the reporting provisions of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board's Statement No. 34 (GASB 34), this discussion and analysis provides some comparisons to prior years.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The financial statements presented herein include all of the activities of the Town of Kensington using the integrated approach as prescribed by GASB Statement 34, as amended by GASB Statement 84. This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Town of Kensington's financial statements. The basic financial statements are comprised of three components:

- Government-wide financial statements
 - Fund financial statements
- Notes to the basic financial statements

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Fown's finances, in a manner similar to most private-sector companies.

The statement of net position presents information on all of the Town's assets, deferred outflows, liabilities and deferred inflows, with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases and decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Town is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the Town's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All of the current year's revenue and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain the control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Town uses fund accounting to ensure and to demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The Town maintains two fund types: governmental and fiduciary funds.

statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. The Town adopts an annual appropriation budget for its governmental funds. A budgetary comparison has been provided for the General Fund to demonstrate compliance with this budget. Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of individuals, private organizations or other governments. Fiduciary funds are not reflected in the government-wide financial statements because the resources of those funds are not available to support the Town's own programs

Town of Kensington Activities

The Town's net position increased by \$161,582 during the current year, as result of revenues in excess of expenses and reduction of long-term liabilities.

The General Fund shows a fund balance of \$1,761,794. This is an increase of \$265,227 from the prior year resulting from revenues in excess of expenditures. The total fund balance of \$535,318 in the nonmajor governmental funds is non-spendable, restricted or committed for the purposes of the individually established fund. The total fund balance in the normajor governmental funds as of December 31, 2022 increased by \$98,211 from the prior year.

Capital Assets

The Town considers a capital asset to be an asset whose cost exceeds \$5,000 and has a useful life of greater than one year. Assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over the course of their estimated useful lives.

The Town's investment in capital assets for its governmental activities as of December 31, 2022 is \$4,672,234. However, this only includes infrastructure (roads, bridges etc.) acquired since 2004 as those capital asset types acquired prior to that date were not recorded. Accumulated depreciation amounts to \$2,024,133, leaving a net book value of \$2,648,101. This investment in capital assets includes equipment and real property. See Note 4 to the basic financial statements for a detail of activity.

Long-Term Obligations

During 2022 the Town had a net decrease in general obligation bonds in governmental activities of (\$35,712), as a result of scheduled payments on existing debt and amortization of bond premium. See Note 5 to the basic financial statements for a detail of activity.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

Budgetary information for the General Fund is included in the Required Supplementary Information section. The Town brought in additional revenues over budget from licenses and permits of \$66,374, representing the largest Actual revenues on the budgetary basis were less than the budgeted amount by \$88,602. portion of the excess revenues. Actual expenditures and other financing uses were slightly under budget on its total appropriation budget by \$71,087.

Economic Factors

The Town continues to be in good financial condition with little long-term debt and a stable General Fund

In December 2022 the town was paid the Grant funds from The Recycling Partnership totaling \$12,058.82, these funds were used to offset the cost of the recycling program with Casella.

The Police Department obtained grant money for various programs totaling \$1,998.46.

Emergency Management continued to receive their Seabrook Station Grant funds in the amount of \$6,375 for the year 2022 In 2022 the Town made the 14th year payment for the Kimball Farm Bond in the amount of \$35,000,00 and interest in the amount of \$8,131,00. This 20-year debt for the town will make its final payment in

In 2022 the town established a Wildlife Mingation Expendable Trust Fund and added \$10,500 to that find.

The town voted to have 100% of the Land Use Change Tax go to the Conservation Commission

The voters approved the New Ambulance with \$200,000 from grant funds and \$150,000 from the Kensington EMS Fund.

NOTE 1—SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Town of Kensington, New Hampshue conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America for local governmental units, except as indicated heremafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

Financial Reporting Entity

The Town of Kensungton, New Hampshue (the Town) was incorporated in 1737. The Town operates under the Town Meeting/Board of Selectmen form of government and performs local governmental functions authorized by State law.

The Town has no other separate organizational units, which meet criteria for inclusion in the financial statements as defined by the Governmental Accounting The financial statements include those of the various departments governed by the Board of Selectmen Standards Board (GASB)

Basis of Presentation

The Town's basic financial statements consist of government-wide statements, including a statement of net position and a statement of activities, and fund financial statements which provide a more detailed level of financial information.

1. Government-Wide Financial Statements:

The statement of net position and the statement of activities display information about the Town as a whole. These statements include the financial activities of the primary government, except for fiduciary

that are specifically associated with a service, program or department and therefore clearly identifiable to revenues of the Town. The comparison of direct expenses with program revenues identifies the extent to The statement of net position presents the financial condition of the governmental activities of the Town at year end. The statement of activities presents a companison between direct expenses and program revenues for each program or function of the Town's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those a particular function. Program revenues include charges paid by the recipient of the goods or services offered by the program, grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program and interest earned on grants that are required to be used to support a particular program. Revenues which are not classified as program revenues are presented as general which each governmental function is self-financing or draws from the general revenues of the Town.

2. Fund Financial Statements:

statements are designed to present financial information of the Town at this more detailed level. The focus of governmental fund financial statements is on major funds. Each major fund is presented in a During the year, the Town segregates transactions related to certain Town functions or activities in separate funds in order to aid financial management and to demonstrate legal compliance. separate column. Nonmajor funds are aggregated and presented in a single column. The fiduciary funds are reported by type.

Fund Accounting

The Town uses funds to maintain its financial records during the year. A fund is defined as a fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts. The Town employs the use of two categories of funds: governmental and fiduciary.

Governmental Funds:

Governmental funds are those through which most governmental functions typically are financed. Governmental fund reporting focuses on the sources, uses and balances of current financial resources. Expendable assets are assigned to the various governmental funds according to the purposes for which they may or must be used. Current liabilities are assigned to the fund from which they will be paid. The difference between governmental fund assets and deferred outflows of resources, and liabilities and deferred inflows of resources, is reported as fund balance. The following are the Town's major governmental funds:

The General Fund is the main operating fund of the Town and is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

The ARPA Fund is a special revenue fund used to account for all financial resources and activities funded through the American Rescue Plan Act.

2. Fiduciary Funds:

Fiduciary fund reporting focuses on net position and changes in net position. The fiduciary fund category is comprised of private-purpose trust funds and custodial funds. Private-purpose trust funds are used to account for assets held by the Town under a trust agreement for individuals, private organizations, or other governments and are therefore not available to support the Town's own programs. The Town's private-purpose trust funds account for grants and scholarship funds of the School District. Custodial funds are held and administered by the Town for the benefit of others; therefore, assets of the custodial funds are not available to support the Town. The Town's custodial funds consist of property taxes collected on behalf of the Exeter Region Cooperative School District, Kensington School District, and Rockingham County, motor vehicle fees collected on behalf of the State of New Hampshire, and the capital reserve funds of the Rensington School District, which are held by the Town as required by State law.

Measurement Focus

1. Government-Wide Financial Statements:

The government-wide financial statements are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus. All assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources associated with the operation of the Town are included on the Statement of Net Position.

2. Fund Financial Statements:

All governmental funds are accounted for using a flow of current financial resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, only current assets, deferred outflows of resources, current liabilities and deferred inflows of resources generally are included on the balance sheet. The statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances reports on the sources (i.e., revenues and other financing sources) and uses (i.e., expenditures and other financing uses) of current financial resources. This approach differs from the manner in which the governmental activities of the government-wide financial statements are prepared. Governmental fund financial statements therefore include a reconciliation with brief explanations to better identify the relationship between the government-wide statements and the statements for governmental funds.

The fiduciary funds are reported using the economic resources measurement focus.

Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting determines when transactions are recorded in the financial records and reported on the financial statements. Government-wide financial statement are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. Fiduciary funds also use the accrual basis of accounting. Governmental funds use the modified accrual basis of accounting. Differences in the accrual and the modified accrual basis of accounting arise in the recognition of revenue and in the presentation of expenses versus expenditures.

1. Revenues - Exchange and Non-exchange Transactions:

Revenue resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded on the accrual basis when the exchange takes place. On a modified accrual basis, revenue is recorded in the year in which the resources are measurable and become available. Available means that the resources will be collected within the current year or are expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay labilities of the current year. For the Town, available means expected to be received within sixty days of year end.

Non-exchange transactions, in which the Town receives value without directly giving equal value in return, include property taxes, grants, entitlements and donations. On an accrual basis, revenue from property taxes is recognized in the year for which the taxes are levied (see Note 11). Revenue from grants, entitlements and donations is recognized in the year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the year when the resources are required to be used or the year when use is first permitted, matching requirements, in which the Town must provide local resources to be used for a specified purpose; and expenditure requirements, in which the resources are provided to the Town on a reimbursement basis. On a modified accrual basis, revenue from non-exchange transactions must also be available before it can be recognized.

Under the modified accrual basis, the following revenue sources are considered to be both measurable and available at year end: property taxes, charges for services, and interest on investments.

Licenses and permits and miscellaneous revenues are recorded as revenues when received in cash because they are generally not measurable until actually received.

Grants and entitlements received before the eligibility requirements are met are recorded as advances from grantors. On governmental fund financial statements, taxes receivable that will not be collected from grantors. Budgetary Data

The Town's budget represents functional appropriations as authorized by annual or special Town meetings. The Selectmen may transfer finds between operating categories as they deem necessary. The Town adopts its budget under State regulations, which differ somewhat from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America in that the focus is on the entire governmental unit rather than on the basis of fund types. State law requires balanced budgets but permits the use of beginning fund balance to reduce the property tax rate. For the year ended December 31, 2022, the Town did not apply any of its unappropriated fund balance to reduce taxes.

Investments are stated at their fair value in all funds. Certificates of deposit and repurchase agreements with a maturity of greater than ninety days from the date of issuance are included in investments.

Taxes Receivable

Taxes levied during the current year and prior and uncollected at December 31, 2022 are recorded as receivables net of reserves for estimated uncollectibles of \$10,000.

Accounts Receivable

Charges for services billed during the current year and prior and uncollected at December 31, 2022 are recorded as receivables net of reserves for estimated uncollectibles of \$21,685 in the EMS Revolving Fund, a Nonmajor Governmental Fund.

Capital Assets

General capital assets result from expenditures in the governmental funds. These assets are reported in the government-wide statement of net position, but are not reported in the governmental fund financial

All capital assets, including infrastructure and intangible assets are capitalized at cost (or estimated historical cost) and updated for additions and retirements during the year. Donated capital assets are

Bond Premiums

Bond premiums are amortized as a component of interest expense over the life of the related bond using the effective interest rate method. Bonds payable are reported in the accompanying financial statements gross of any applicable unamortized bond premiums.

Accrued Liabilities and Long-Term Obligations

Except for the obligation for certain other post-employment benefits (see Note 2), all payables, accrued liabilities, and long-term obligations are reported in the government-wide financial statements. In general, governmental fund payables and accrued liabilities that, once incurred, are paid in a tunely manner and in Long-term obligations that will be paid from governmental funds are recognized as a liability in the fund financial statements when due. full from current resources, are reported as obligations of the funds.

Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions (OPEB)

For purposes of measuring the net OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB, and OPEB expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the New Hampshire Retirement System (NHRS) OPEB Plan and additions to/deductions from NHRS's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by NHRS. For this purpose, NHRS recognizes benefit payments when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms.

Investments are reported at fair value, except for non-registered commingled funds valued at net asset value (NAV) as a practical expedient to estimate fair value.

Net Pension Liability

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the New Hampshire Retirement System (NHRS) and additions to/deductions from NHRS's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by NHRS. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms.

Net Position

Net position represents the difference between assets and defenred outflows of resources, and liabilities and deferred inflows of resources. Net investment in capital assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, reduced by the outstanding balances on any borrowings used for the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets. Net position is reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through the enabling legislation adopted by the Town or through external restrictions imposed by reditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments. Unrestricted net position is the net amount of the assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources that are not included in the determination of net investment in capital assets or the restricted components of net position.

The Town's policy is to first apply restricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position is available.

Fund Balance Policy

The Town segregates fund balance into five classifications: Nonspendable, Restricted, Committed, Assigned, and Unassigned These components of fund balance are defined as follows:

- Nonspendable Fund Balance: Amounts that are not in a spendable form or are required to be maintained intact.
- <u>Restricted Fund Balance</u>: Amounts constrained to specific purposes stipulated by external resource providers or through enabling legislation. Restrictions may be changed or lifted only with the consent of the resource providers or by the enabling legislation.
- Committed Fund Balance: Amounts that can be used only for the specific purposes determined by a formal action of the Town's highest level of decision making authority (amunal Town Meeting). Commitments may be changed or lifted only by the governing body taking the same formal action that imposed the constraint originally. The governing body's actions must either be approved or rescinded, as applicable, prior to the last day of the fiscal year for which the commitment is made. The amount subject to the constraint may be determined in the subsequent period.
- <u>Assigned Fund Balance</u>: Amounts the Town intends to use for specific purposes; intent can be expressed by the governing body or by an official or body to which the governing body delegates the authority.

Unassigned Fund Balance: Amounts that are available for any purpose; these amounts are
reported only in the General Fund, except for, any deficit balance of another governmental fund.

As of December 31, 2022 the Town has not adopted a formal fund balance policy.

In instances where expenditures are incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available, restricted fund balance is considered to have been spent first. When expenditures are incurred for purposes for which amounts in any of the unrestricted fund balance classifications can be used, committed amounts should be reduced first, followed by assigned amounts, then unassigned amounts.

Interfund Activity

Exchange transactions between funds are reported as revenues in the seller funds and as expenditures/ expenses in the purchaser funds. Flows of cash or goode from one fund to another without a requirement for repayment are reported as interfund transfers. Interfund transfers are reported as other financing councestuses in governmental funds. Repayments from funds responsible for particular expenditures/ expenses to the funds that initially paid for them are not presented in the financial statements.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

NOTE 1—STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Other Post employment Benefits

The Town did not implement the provisions of GASB Statement 75, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions as it pertains to its single employer OPEB plan. GASB Statement 75 requires governments to account for certain other postemployment benefits (OPEB) pinantly healthcare, on an accrual basis rather than on a pay-as-you-go basis. The provisions of GASB Statement 75 were required to be implemented by the Town during the year ended December 31, 2018. The Town has implemented the provisions of GASB Statement 73 as it pertains to its cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit OPEB plan (see Note 7).

NOTE 3—CHANGE IN ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLE

During the year ended December 31, 2022, the Town implemented GASB Statement No. 87, Leazes. Under GASB Statement No. 87, a lease liability and an intangible right to use asset is recognized for leasing arrangements where the Town is the lessee. The Town has entered into various rental agreements as lessee for buildings and equipment. Management has determined that the effect of implementing GASB Statement No. 87 related to these leases is immaterial to it financial statements.

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Town's deposits may not be returned. Custodial credit risk for investments is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the collateral securities that are in the possession of another party. Fair Value Measurement of Investments

The Town categorizes the fair value measurements of its investments within the fair value hierarchy established by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States. The fair value hierarchy categorizes the inputs to valuation techniques used for fair value measurement into three levels as follows (in order of priority):

- <u>Level I Inputs</u> Inputs that reflect quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Town has the ability to access at the measurement date.
 - Level 2 Inputs Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for assets or liabilities either directly or indirectly, including inputs in markets that are not considered to be active.
 - Level 3 Inputs Significant unobservable inputs.

Investment in NHPDIP

The Town is a voluntary participant in the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool (NHPDIP), an external investment pool. The NHPDIP is not registered with the United States Securities and Exchange Commission as an investment company. The NHPDIP was created by state law and is administered by a public body of state, local and banking officials. Financial statements for the NHPDIP can be accessed through the NHPDIP's website at www.nhrs.org.

The Town's exposure to derivatives is indirect through its participation in the NHPDIP. The Town's proportional share of these derivatives is not available. The fair value of the position in the investment pool is equal to the value of the pool shares.

The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2021 valuation were based on the results of the most recent actuarial experience study, which was for the period July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2019. Under this method, an expected future real return range is calculated separately for each asset class. State and local employees and teachers belong to Group I. Police and firefighters belong to Group II. permanent police officers within the State are eligible and required to participate in the Pension Plan.

Benefits Provided

Benefit formulas and eligibility requirements for the pension plan are set by State law (RSA 100-A)

Group I benefits are provided based on creditable service and average final salary for the highest of either three or five years, depending on when service commenced. Group II benefits are provided based on age, years of creditable service and a benefit multiplier depending on vesting status as of January 1, 2012. The maximum retirement allowance for Group II members vested by January 1, 2012 (45 years of age with 20 years of service or age 60 regardless of years

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of creditable service) is the average final compensation multiplied by 2.3% multiplied by creditable service. For Group II members not vested by January 1, 2012 the benefit is calculated the same way but the multiplier used in the calculation will change depending on age and years of creditable service as follows:

Funding Policy

Covered police officers are required to contribute 11.55% of their covered salary. The Town is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The Town's contribution rate for the covered payroll of police officers was 30.67% for the year ended December 31, 2022. The Town contributes 100% of the employer cost for police officers of the Town.

Per RSA-100-A:16, plan member contribution rates are established and may be amended by the New Hampshire State legislature and employer contribution rates are determined by the NHRS Board of Trustees based on an actuarial valuation. The Town's contributions to the NHRS for the year ended December 31, 2022 were \$160,114.

Pension Liabilines, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

At December 31, 2022, the Town reported a liability of \$1,404,820 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2022, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by a roll forward of the actuarial valuation from June 30, 2021. The Town's proportion of the net pension liability was based on actual contributions by the Town during the relevant fiscal year relative to the actual contributions of all participating plan members, excluding contributions to separately finance specific liabilities of individual employers or NHRS. The net amount of deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions is reflected as an increase to unrestricted net position in the amount of \$518,375. The Town reported \$80,705 as defeared outflows of resources related to pensions resulting from Town contributions subsequent to the measurement date. This amount will be recognized as a reduction of the net pension liability in the measurement penied ended June 30, 2023. Other amounts reported as deferred outflows of resources related to pensions will be recognized in pension expense for the measurement penieds as follows:

Montality rates were based on the Pub-2010 Healthy Retiree Montality Tables with credibility adjustments for each group (Police and Fire combined) and projected fully generational mortality improvements using Scale MP-2019.

The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2021 valuation were based on the results of the most recent actuarial experience study, which was for the period July 1, 2015 – June 30, 2019.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was selected from a best estimate range determined using the building block approach. Under this method, an expected future real return range is raclculated separately for each asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return net of investment expenses by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Following is a table presenting target allocations and geometric real rates of return for each asset class:

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the collective pension liability was 6.75%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that plan member contributions will be made at the current contribution rate and that employer contributions will be made at rates equal to the difference between actuarially determined contribution rates and the member rate. For purposes of the projection, member contributions are projected based on the expected payroll of current members only. Based on those assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the collective pension liability.

Sensitivity of the Town's Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability to Changes in the Discount Rate

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NOTE 11—PROPERTY TAXES

Taxes are levied on the assessed valuation of all taxable real property as of the prior April 1 (\$403,918,460 as of April 1, 2022) and are due in two installments on July 6, 2022 and December 14, 2022. Taxes paid after the due dates accrue interest at 8% per annum. Property taxes are recognized as revenue when received in cash or if available to finance current period operations (within sixty days of year-end).

Under State law, the Tax Collector obtains tax liens on properties which have unpaid taxes in the following calendar year after taxes were due for the amount of unpaid taxes, interest and costs. Priority tax liens obtained prior to April 1, 2019 accurue interest at 18% per amount. Priority tax liens obtained after April 1, 2019 accurue interest at 14% per amount. If the property is not redeemed within a two year redemption period, the property may be tax deeded to the Town.

In accordance with State law, the Town collects taxes for the Exeter Region Cooperative School District, Kensington School District, and Rockingham County, all independent governmental units, which are remitted to them as required by law. The Town also collects State of New Hampshire Education taxes, which are remitted directly to the school districts. Total taxes appropriated during the year were \$5,807,426 for the Exeter Region Cooperative School District and Kensington School District combined, and \$32,899 for Rockingham County. These taxes are recognized in these financial statements within the fiduciary finds only. The Town bears responsibility for uncollected taxes.

NOTE 12—INTERFUND BALANCES

The Town has combined the cash resources of its governmental funds. For accounting and reporting purposes, that portion of the pooled cash balance is reported in the specific fund as an interfund balance. Interfund balances at December 31, 2022 are as follows:

NOTE 13—RISK MANAGEMENT

The Town is exposed to various risks of losses related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. During the year ended December 31, 2022, the Town was a member of and participated in a public entity risk pool (Trust) for property and liability insurance and worker's compensation coverage. Coverage has not been significantly reduced from the prior year and settled claims have not exceeded coverage in any of the past three years.

The Trust agreements permit the Trust to make additional assessments to members should there be a deficiency in Trust assets to meet its liabilities. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require members of pools with a sharing of risk to determine whether or not such

assessment is probable and, if so, a reasonable estimate of such assessment. At this time, the Trust foresees no likelihood of an additional assessment for any of the past years. Claims expenditures and liabilities are reported when it is probable that a loss has occurred and the amount of that loss can be reasonably estimated. These losses include an estimate of claims that have been incurred but not reported. Based on the best available information there is no liability at December 31, 2022.

Property and Liability Insurance

The Trust provides certain property and liability insurance coverage to member towns, cities, and other qualified political subdivisions of New Hampshue. As a member of the Trust, the Town shares in contributing to the cost of and receiving benefit from a self-insured pooled risk management program. The program includes a Self-Insured Retention Fund from which is paid up to \$200,000 for each and every covered property, crime and/or liability loss that exceeds \$1,000, up to an aggregate of \$1,200,000. Each property loss is subject to a \$1,000 deductible. All losses over the aggregate are covered by insurance policies.

Worker's Compensation

The Trust provides statutory worker's compensation coverage to member towns, cities, and other qualified political subdivisions of New Hampshue. The Trust is self-sustaining through amutal member premiums and provides coverage for the statutorily required workers' compensation benefits and employer's liability coverage up 0.52,000,000. The program includes a Loss Fund from which is paid up to \$5500,000 for each and every covered claim.

NOTE 14—CONTINGENCIES

Lingation

There may be various claims and suits pending against the Town, which arise in the normal course of the Town's activities. In the opinion of Town management, any potential claims against the Town which are not covered by insurance are immaterial and would not affect the financial position of the Town.

Federal Grants

The Town participates in a number of federally assisted grant programs. These programs are subject to financial and compliance audits by the grantors or their representatives. The amounts, if any, of expenditures which may be disallowed by the granting agency cannot be determined at this time, although the Town expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

Dear Citizens of Kensington,

We are growing! This year, Kensington Elementary School has 32 kindergarteners, the most we have had in my ten years here at KES. We are excited that new families are choosing Kensington as their home and the place where they want their children to grow up. This continues to be a wonderful, welcoming town for families and KES is proud to be part of it.

In my letter last year, I mentioned that the students at KES were beginning to embark on a schoolwide journey to answer the question, "How has Kensington changed and how do we tell that story?" It took many months of reading, research, local fieldtrips and personal interviews to find answers and we learned so much about our town! We were fortunate to have the support of the Kensington Historical Society for this project and on June 8, 2023 we shared our new knowledge with a Celebration of Learning. With many, many families and community members in attendance, first graders presented what they had learned about how our roads and neighborhoods have changed and second graders shared what they learned about the past, present, and future of the Grange. Third graders talked about how transportation has changed, and our fourth and fifth graders shared the history of hydropower and agriculture in Kensington as well as their ideas on how robotics could help solve future farming issues in town. Students also partnered with the Kensington Public Library and Kensington Fire Department to record videos about our community's history, which can be found on our town website.

At the Celebration we honored Kensington's eldest resident at the time, Mrs. Bernice Brewer, by presenting her with a golden "key to the town". Mrs. Brewer played an instrumental role in helping our Kindergarten students understand how her life as a child in Kensington was very different than their's today and we are thankful our students were able to spend time with her and learn from her last year.







"Mrs. Brewer didn't have a favorite toy because she was always playing outside with her friends."

"They used a fireplace and woodstove to keep warm."

"She didn't have a TV or video games or a cell phone or a computer, but she did have a house phone."

"She didn't have Kindergarten at her school and there was only one teacher."

Kensington Elementary School is grateful to have such strong partnerships with our local community organizations. Each month, the Kensington Recreation Department invites our kindergarten students to join local Seniors during their Coffee Talk. Our youngest and oldest residents in town look forward to their time together each month - sharing books, singing songs and doing projects. The Kensington Public Library has continued its partnership with KES and our close proximity to the library allows students to easily access the opportunities and after-school programs the library offers. The walkway connecting the school to the library, which was a collaborative project and installed in 2015, gets plenty of use! We are thankful for the continued support of the Kensington Police Department and Kensington Fire Department as they are always thinking about how to best keep our school safe for our students and staff. We appreciate you!

My 10 years as principal have gone by so quickly! The seniors graduating from Exeter High School this year were in third grade when I started at KES and I think about what has changed and what has stayed the same since they've been here in the building. There are new books, new furniture, new ways to teach math and some new faces on our staff, but the heart of KES has remained steadfast; we believe in the wellbeing of our students, providing meaningful learning opportunities and maintaining a positive community climate.

Article 01 Operating Budget

Shall the Kensington School District raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$4,372,467? Kensington School District Deliberative Session Meeting Minutes Wednesday February 8th, 2023 6:00pm

Representatives in Attendance: Josh Gould, Jenny Leonard, Alison Roy, Christopher Andriski, Becky Ruel, Mollie O'Keefe.

At 6:00 Harold Bragg called the meeting to order.

Harold Bragg announced that the meeting minutes from the deliberative session in 2022 had a clerical error with the wrong year noted on the date of the meeting minutes. The meeting minutes stated the meeting was in 2021 when it occurred in 2022. Harold asked that the date on the meeting minutes from last year be corrected to reflect the correct year on the date of the meeting. There were no questions or discussions raised from the public in attendance.

Harold Bragg read Article 1:

Article 1: Shall the Kensington School District raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$4,147,803? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$4,010,392, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Kensington School District or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. The Kensington School Board Recommends \$4,147,803.

Mrs. Leonard presented highlights in the operating budget which includes the change in health insurance guaranteed maximum rate (GMR), increased SAU assessment, additional facilities projects, and changes in special education needs.

There were no questions or discussions raised from the public in attendance regarding Article 1.

Harold Bragg read Article 2:

Article 2: Shall the Kensington School District <u>will</u> vote to raise and appropriate up to \$10,000 to be placed in the Special Education Expendable Trust Fund previously established for the unanticipated special education costs at Kensington Elementary

School? This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No additional amount to be raised from taxation. The Kensington School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Harold noted the the clerical error and the word "will", and asked if anyone objected to striking the word "will". No objection from the public in attendance.

Jim Thompson asked if we appropriated funds to this trust fund last year, and what was done with the money. Alison Roy explained yes it was done last year, and the money is building in the bank.

There were no amendments raised from the public in attendance regarding Article 2.

Harold Bragg read Article 3:

Article 3: Shall the Kensington School District will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$10,000 to be placed in the Repair and Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund previously established for building maintenance costs at Kensington Elementary School? This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No additional amount to be raised from taxation. The Kensington School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

2024 WARRANT

Article 01 Operating Budget

Shall the Exeter Regional Cooperative School District raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$68,530,556? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$67,321,190 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the District or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. The Exeter Regional Cooperative School Board and Budget Advisory Committee recommend \$68,530,556 as set forth on said budget. (Majority vote required)

Article 02 Capital Reserve Fund

Shall the Exeter Regional Cooperative School District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$200,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund previously established in 1998 for the purpose of construction, reconstruction, or acquisition of school buildings and/or school ground site improvements including associated engineering and architectural fees, and further to name the school board as agents to expend this fund? This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No additional amount to be raised from taxation. The Exeter Regional Cooperative School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Article 03 CRF for Synthetic Turf Replacement

Shall the Exeter Regional Cooperative School District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$50,000 to be added to the Synthetic Turf Replacement Capital Reserve Fund previously established under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for replacement of the synthetic turf field located at Exeter High School? This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No amount to be raised from taxation. The Exeter Regional Cooperative School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Article 04 Investment Management of Trust Funds

Shall the Exeter Regional Cooperative School District vote, pursuant to RSA 35:9-a,III, to authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to pay for Capital reserve fund investment services, and any other expenses incurred, from capital reserve funds income? Such authority shall remain in effect until rescinded by vote of the region cooperative district meeting. No vote to rescind the authority shall occur within 5 years of the original adoption of this article. (Estimated Tax Impact: None. No amount to be raised by taxation). (Majority vote required) The Exeter Regional Cooperative School Board recommends approval of this warrant article.

Article 05 Articles of Agreement of the Exeter Regional Coop

To see if the Exeter Regional Cooperative School District will vote to amend the Articles of Agreement of the Exeter Regional Cooperative School District by deleting the following lines from Article 3, "All Board members shall be elected by the voters "at large." "After the initial term, voting for Cooperative School Board members, who shall continue to be elected at large, shall be by the voters of each town at the elections held for town officers." These lines in Article 3, would be replaced as follows, "Each new or re-elected member of the Exeter Regional Cooperative School Board shall be elected at the conclusion of each existing member's term, by the voters from the corresponding district he/she represents and must be a resident of that corresponding district.

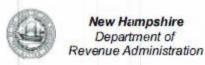

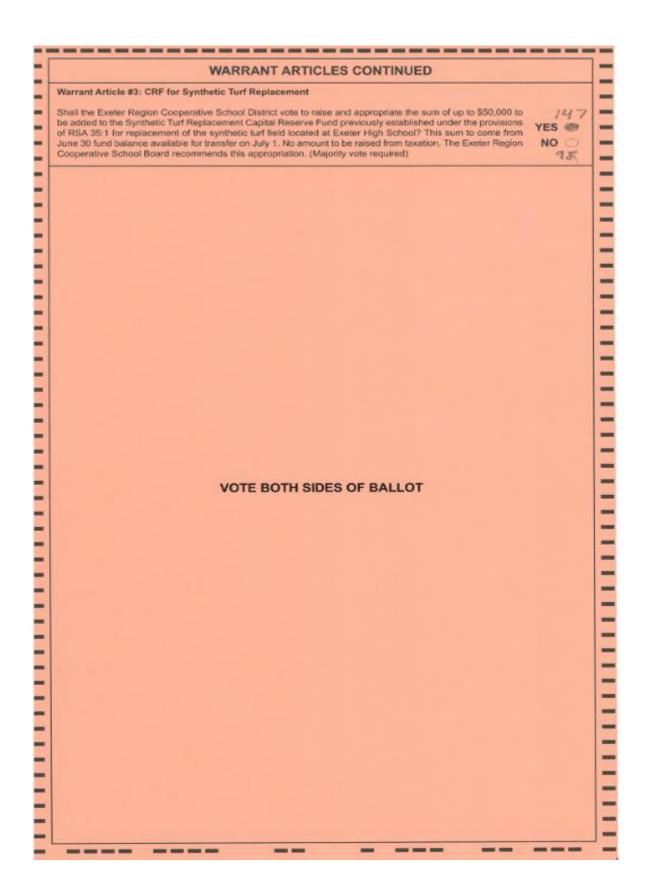

Moderator Miller called the meeting to order at 2:00 PM.

Sawyer Camlin, student representative to the school board, led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance. Helen Joyce, Chair of the ERCSD School Board, thanked all voters for coming out. She extended her appreciation to all board members, administration, budget advisory committee members and support staff for their time in putting together the warrant articles. She acknowledged retiring budget committee members and retiring faculty at the end of the school year. She also recognized two retiring school board members, Kim Casey and Travis Thompson.

Moderator Miller reviewed the rules and procedures of the meeting and requested permission for David Ryan and Mollie O'Keefe to speak at the meeting. Permission was granted.

Article 01: Operating Budget

Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$68,913,899 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the District or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. The School Board and Budget Advisory Committee recommend \$69,224,030 as set forth on said budget. (Majority vote required)

Travis Thompson, Stratham, moved to take up the Article and Kimberly Meyer, Exeter seconded.

Travis Thompson, Stratham, explained the process of how the budget is developed.

A presentation via video was presented outlining and highlighting the changes addressing the increases (predominantly due to the increases in health insurance and contractual obligations) and decreases (one time expenses and snow removal).

James Berlo, Brentwood offered an amendment to decrease the budget to \$66,000,000.

Michelle Siudut, Brentwood seconded the amendment.

Elizabeth Faria, Brentwood offered a friendly amendment to James Berlo's amendment to decrease the budget to \$67,224,030.

The friendly amendment was denied.

Discussion supporting the amendment followed highlighting the decreased ranking, lower enrollment, the surplus at the end of the year and the increases in the budget are not sustainable.

Discussion not supporting the amendment was also offered. Test scores are on the rise, cutting the budget is short sighted, education of our students is an investment in our community and program cuts would be devastating.

The amendment was defeated with 16 voting in support of the amendment and the majority voting not to support the amendment.

Elizabeth Faria, Brentwood offered an amendment to Article 01 to decrease the operating budget to \$67,224,030.

Ted Lloyd, East Kingston seconded the amendment.

This amendment was also defeated with 19 voting in support and the majority voting not to support. Moderator Miller declared the article would appear on ballot on March 14th as written.

Bill Gauthier, Exeter moved to restrict reconsideration of the article and Jason Faria, Exeter seconded.

Article 02 Capital Reserve Fund

Shall the Exeter Region Cooperative School District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$150,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund previously established in 1998 for the purpose of construction, reconstruction, or acquisition of school buildings and/or school ground site improvements including associated engineering and architectural fees, and further to name the school board as agents to expend this fund? This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No additional amount to be raised from taxation. The Exeter Region Cooperative School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Paul Bauer, Newfields motioned to take up the article and Bob Hall, Kensington seconded.

Paul Bauer, Newfields talked about the fiscal responsibility of planning ahead for projects such as reroofing the high school which was installed in 2005 with a 15 year warranty.

No further discussion.

Scott Dennehy, Brentwood moved to restrict reconsideration of the article and Kim Casey, East Kingston seconded.

Article 03 CRF for Synthetic Turf Replacement

Shall the Exeter Region Cooperative School District vote to raise and appropriate the sumof up to \$50,000 to be added to the Synthetic Turf Replacement Capital Reserve Fund previously established under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for replacement of the synthetic turf field located at Exeter High School? This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No amount to be raised from taxation. The Exeter Region Cooperative School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Bob Hall, Kensington explained the turf was replaced in 2022 but there is a need to start to plan for the future.

Discussion followed about whether this money would need to be dedicated to synthetic replacement if in the future something better was to be recommended. A question was also raised about whether there is information about carcinogens.

The synthetic turf is a combination of rubber and sand. It is well maintained and the amount of injuries is tracked.

The article is specific to synthetic replacement. The article cannot be eliminated but the dollar amount can be changed. It will take a 2/3rds vote to change the purpose of this fund in the future.

Lois DeYoung, Brentwood offered an amendment to decrease the amount on this article to 0 and Elizabeth Faria, Brentwood seconded.

The amendment was defeated with 4 voting in support and the majority voting not to support. Paul Bauer, Newfields moved to restrict reconsideration of the article and Kim Casey, East Kingston seconded.

Travis Thompson, Stratham motioned to adjourn the meeting and Mr. Kane of Exeter seconded the motion.

There were 33 out of 3,281 voters from Brentwood, 6 out of 1,752 voters from East Kingston, 41 out of 11,894 voters from Exeter, 6 out of 1,702 voters from Kensington, 3 out of 1,328 voters from Newfields and 14 out of 6,162 voters from Stratham present at the ERCSD Deliberative Session.

The total being 103 voters out of 26,119 registered voters in the ERCSD were present.

SAU 16 ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 2023 VISION FOR THE GRADUATE

Each graduate demonstrates engaged learning and citizenship through the ability to solve problems independently and collaboratively with perseverance and resilience, and communicates solutions with confidence and empathy.

SAU 16 represents the towns of Brentwood, East Kingston, Exeter, Kensington, Newfields, and Stratham. Each town has an individual school board that governs their elementary schools. All students in grades six through twelve come together forming the Exeter Region Cooperative School District, which is governed by the Exeter Region Cooperative School Board. The SAU 16 Joint School Board is composed of all members of each one of the seven individual school boards to govern the office of the Superintendent.

During the 2022-2023 school year the Joint Board was tasked with hiring a new Superintendent. This board worked hard to create a process that provided multiple opportunities for feedback to guide members in hiring a person that met the needs of the SAU 16 community. In December 2023, the Joint Board named Dr. Esther Asbell as the incoming Superintendent effective July 1, 2023. I am humbled and honored to have this role in SAU 16.

Throughout the 2022-2023 school year, educators at all levels continued to develop and implement multi-tiered support systems (MTSS) to meet the academic and social needs of our students. Academically all elementary schools as well as the middle school continued to implement interventions by providing individualized specific skill building opportunities for students. Exeter High School developed an intervention process to be implemented in the 2023-2024 school year. All schools have MTSS plans in meeting the social needs of our students.

Educators continued to grow, with many pursuing ongoing degrees and by participating in professional development that is highlighted in their individual digital portfolios. This learning was shared with each other at the March 2023 in-service day by having peers present to peers allowing for all districts to learn from our internal experts.

Also during the 2022-2023 school year, we continued to create a sense of belonging for all families, students, staff, and board members. Learning opportunities throughout the year resulted in conversations about curriculum, discipline processes, and access to all for an equitable education.

As I reflect upon my many years in SAU 16, I want to take this opportunity to thank each community in supporting our efforts in providing our students with learning environments that enact the SAU 16 Vision of a Graduate.
