The KCPC reviewed two companies that presented to the Kensington Energy Committee:

- Standard Power (SP)
- Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire (CPCNH).

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These companies represent two models of power suppliers currently providing community power.

- Standard Power is a for-profit third party broker
- Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire is a not-for-profit 501(c)(4) coalition of members in New Hampshire.
